Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather Nov 26th, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a poor week for field activities with an average of 2.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 59° (F), a low of -7° (F) and a state average temperature of 32° (F). Snow melt combined with cold winter rains kept wet fields wet and provided little, if any, opportunity for end-of-season field work. Unharvested corn and soybeans remain standing in fields where some operators made a last attempt to harvest this week despite wet fields. Little else was reported in the way of field activities this week.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had a week of various temperatures. Monday and Tuesday were 30-40's. Wednesday-Friday were colder temperatures into the teens and froze the ground. Saturday was low 30's then into mid 30's and rained pretty much all day. Sunday was 53 degrees and sunny. Corn and soybeans continue to be harvested when field conditions were better mostly Wednesday-Friday, There is still both crops in fields standing but the colder temperatures later last week permitted producers to get some of their crops off even though still wet. Not much other activity in the fields as they are trying hard to get corn and soybeans harvested. Apple harvest is complete and quality issues are apparent and apples will rot in storage due to all the rains we've had. Not a good thing for producers or packers of fresh fruit or processors. Overall the producers are keeping busy with trying to prepare for the winter and some that are finished harvesting are taking a big breath saying finally the year is over for crops which has been very trying for all farmers regardless what phase of farming you are in. Looking forward to better year for 2019.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Snow melted slowly leaving field too wet for soybean harvest, but later in the week some corn was harvested. Rain again on weekend will limit field work early in the week again.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Snow put an end to field work.

CENTRE County, Adriana Murillo-Williams

There is still snow on the ground from last week's storm. Weather conditions remain cool and wet and have kept farmers from finishing up with harvest.
